2. Poplar Town Hall (now Bow House Business Centre), Bow Road/Fairfield Road, E3.

Sculptures - There are five sculptures in low relief in Portland stone, in the form of

panels on the front of the canopy over the main entrance to the building, showing various

building trades and occupations.

1. Carpenter with saw, with girder of building behind [G].

2. Welder with oxy-acetylene apparatus and lighter steel girders behind [F].

3. Engineer with dividers, set-square, etc, kneeling on steel girders (signed David

Evans Sc) [E].

4. Builder with trowel and stone block hoisted with crane, steel girders behind [D].

5. Builder with cement mixer, barrow and shovel, with steel girders behind [C].

These panels are set in a prominent and very visible position around the face of a curved

canopy over the main entrance, facing onto the street. The building itself is of an

unrelieved Modernistic style, but is also enlivened with contemporary mosaics on the south

side. The iconography of the sculptures - in all probability decided by the architect -

shows themes of workmen engaged in their trades which were common to the period, and is

perhaps appropriate to a Town Hall built in a predominantly working class area of London.

The appearance of steel girders as a backdrop in all the panels is perhaps again a

reference to the high-rise aspirations of the period.


